FIRST READING

Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons. 'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart; he must live outside the camp.'

GOSPEL

Mark 1:40-45

A leper came to Jesus and pleaded on his knees: 'If you want to' he said 'you can cure me.' Feeling sorry for him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him. 'Of course I want to!' he said. 'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured. Jesus immediately sent him away and sternly ordered him, 'Mind you say nothing to anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest, and make the offering for your healing prescribed by Moses as evidence of your recovery.' The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.

The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

PROJECT COMPASSION SUNDAY

The leper is cast aside, pushed away and left alone. The physical attributes of this disease cause many to turn up their noses. Today's readings remind us it has more than a physical consequence. Lepers are rejected and cast out from their communities. Yet Jesus, through his compassionate cry "Of course I want to!" heals the leper physically and allows him to re-enter the community and to re-establish broken relationships. Human solidarity is restored. Relationship with the community is healed.

This healing of community relationships is what Catholic Social Teaching is about. So many issues in our contemporary world prevent solidarity. Today's readings both invite and challenge us to reflect on the issues that divide our world and its people: racism, economic inequalities, unemployment, international debt, lack of access to medical treatment, terrorism, discrimination of all kinds, but especially towards women, food scarcity and political divisions etc. We are called to be like Paul in the second reading who strives "for the benefit of the many" – who seeks the common good – who wants to heal the divisions.

Caritas Australia's annual Lenten appeal, Project Compassion offers us a way in which we can draw closer and heal divisions. This year's Project Compassion theme is *Be More*. It comes from St Oscar Romero, Caritas' patron saint, who said "Aspire not to have more, but to be more." It invites us to look beyond ourselves, to restore relationships with each other in our global family and our earth by living simply and loving generously.
