

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Shine on the world like bright stars; you are offering it the word of life. Alleluia. Gospel Luke: 6:39-45

Jesus told a parable to his disciples: 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

The Heart's Abundance

Here are some parables about how the truth will sneak past our best intentions and present itself. If we do not see the way clearly, we cannot pretend to be guides for others. (Parents, teachers, pastors – and people who write Scripture commentary – beware!) In the end, what is within us will make itself known to all.

That is why it is one of our most urgent responsibilities to guard our hearts. We must guard against bitterness, hopelessness, needless anxiety, cynicism, unfocussed rage, and unforgiveness. It is our primary duty as Christians to love well. We are mandated to love God and one another, and to work our way up to love of enemy and the really tricky ones. We need hearts that are pliable and love that is growing. We cannot afford to surrender to "heart disease" of any kind, those ways of thinking, living, and remembering that cause us to harden our hearts.

If we take care to allow only goodness into our hearts, we will have goodness to share. We speak what we know. We give who we are.

Ouestions for Reflection

- What might people learn from a typical conversation with you?
- Now look with your heart. What more do you see? Look around you with your eyes. Record what you see. What do you find? Take a quick tour through the contents of your heart today.

What do you read, watch on TV, listen to in music, take in from your relationships? Do you take in goodness, or husks that will emerge when you shake the sieve? Spend one day rejecting any influence that is not good for your heart. Consider making this a lifestyle.
