

CALL TO CHARITY

I suspect that Jesus must have liked dogs very much, because in today's Gospel story of Lazarus and the rich man, the dogs treated poor Lazarus better than the rich man did—they licked his wounds. If you've ever had a dog that really likes you, there's one thing you have to watch out for: the unexpected lick!

The dogs were likely the rich man's pets. They were probably allowed to eat the scraps of bread that fell from his table—scraps that Lazarus wasn't even permitted to have. Yet, while the dogs were eating the crumbs, they looked at Lazarus with a kind of sympathy. He wasn't allowed to join them, but they noticed him. And after finishing their meal, they did what any affectionate dog might do—they walked over to Lazarus and licked his wounds.

None of this, however, changed the heart of the rich man.

So this is a really powerful parable about how wealth can lead us to fail in charity toward other human beings and that failure—a grave failure—in charity toward other human beings can be the cause of the loss of eternal life. And I just think that that's something that we don't often think about nowadays.

How many times have you heard people in the modern world say something like, "Well, I never killed anybody." You know? "I'm a good person. I never killed anyone."Well, that's setting the bar rather low in terms of morality and charity. Sins of commission are evil, but sins of omission can be equally grave depending on the gravity of the omission. And in this case, the factors involved in his failing to love Lazarus by caring for him, are two things: luxury and gluttony. He's living a life focused entirely on himself, and both of those are rooted in the capital sin of pride, which is a disordered self-love that leads him to be blind to the sufferings of those around him and to do anything about it. And that is what Jesus is warning us about in this parable—the hardness of heart that can come with luxury, gluttony and wealth.

This week, the Gospel invites us to examine our hearts and identify specific signs of pride: a sense of entitlement to comfort and luxury, indifference toward others, ignoring the call to charity, and forgetting the reality of our mortality. Let us stay alert and strive to root out these manifestations of pride.
